Mixed-stock fisheries:

Mixed-stock fisheries use deadly and indiscriminate nets and long-lines that kill all salmon irrespective of their origins or destinations. This means that the fish they catch may be from rivers where the salmon population is below safe biological levels or even in peril of extinction.
